Light Is Amazing

Last week my family and I sat on our front porch and watched the moon cover the sun in a rare solar eclipse. We had to have special sun glasses in order to look at the sun. With the glasses on the sun appeared to be a perfect orange colored circle. Without the glasses you could not look at the sun because the light was too bright. I watched at the moon began to creep in front of the sun. Soon it was a quarter and then half way in front of the sun, but there was still the influence of light. Finally the sun was three-quarters covered and ten only a sliver was showing, but there was still light. With the majority of the sun being covered, the presence of light was still obvious.

Then the sun was completed covered and it became dark. The night lights in our yard came on. Although it was dark, it was total darkness. While completely covered, a small amount of light was still present. Now with the sun covered you could look at it without the sun glasses and while completely eclipsed, there was still a bright glow that reflected around the moon. In the depth of the darkness, there was the presence of light.

As I think about this phenomena, several thought come to mind. One is when the day became dark during the crucifixion of Jesus. Last week, the mid-day became dark, but not total darkness and it was only about five minutes. At the crucifixion, there was darkness for three hours.

Secondly, as the Bible talks about darkness, it tells us that in hell there will be total darkness, without any presence of light. The apostle Paul writes in 2 Thes 1:9 that those who do not know God and do not obey the gospel of Jesus Christ shall be punished with everlasting punishment away from the presence of the Lord. The Lord is associated with light and if there is no presence of the Lord, i.e. light, then there will be total darkness. There will be no glow of light in hell.

Light is an amazing thing. It is pure. While is can shine through a dirty glass

pane, it does not contaminated by that dirt; it remains pure light.

It penetrates. You can turn on a light at night across the house and around the corner, but it can still be seen. It's hard to completely dispel light.

It gives direction. Without light a person is in the dark and doesn't know where to go. At night, a small night light is enough to give direction in a dark house. Jesus says that the Christian is to be the light in the world. As such our lives need to be pure in motive and deed.

The life of the Christian should be an example for others to follow. It should give direction to a dark world with a good influence, a good example.

As a light in the world, our mission is to penetrated the hearts of others with the gospel message, and in so doing provide the direction to heaven.
