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Baptism of the Holy Ghost

There are a lot of legitimate questions regarding the passage *I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance: but he that cometh after me is mightier than I, whose shoes I am not worthy to bear: he shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost, and with fire.* (Matthew 3:11 KJV) The question is, what is the Holy Ghost baptism, and does it apply to us today?

Acts 1:5 makes reference to this statement made by John the Baptist. In the previous verses, the apostles were told to go and remain in Jerusalem for the *promise of the Father* (Acts 1:2-4). In Luke 24:49 the apostles were instructed to go to Jerusalem and wait until they *be endued with power from on high*.

Here is the setting. The selected apostles of Jesus were waiting in Jerusalem for some type of power to be given to them as promised by the Father. Not knowing exactly what this power was to be, Jesus tells them (Acts 1:5) John truly baptized with water, but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence. Let us not lose sight that Jesus, just moments before His ascension back into heaven, is speaking to His apostles. It was the apostles who were to be baptized not many days hence.

So we advance our thoughts to Acts 2. Here we read about the celebration of the Jewish holiday of Pentecost. It always occurred 50 days after the Passover Feast. Jews from every nation were present for this occasion (Acts 2:5). As you might expect, these Jews being from different parts of the known world spoke in different languages. On this day, the apostles were waiting as they had been instructed in a room, and while there, a strange incident occurred.

(Acts 2:2-4 KJV) And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. {3} And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. {4} And they were all <u>filled with the Holy Ghost</u>, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance. This was the promise from the Father for which they had been waiting.

The ability to speak in different languages (tongues) was the power they were to receive. This event was the baptism of the Holy Ghost that was foretold by John the Baptist back in Matthew 3:11. This was a special event which marked the beginning of the Christian age. The baptism of the Holy Ghost was a promised baptism received by the apostles (also Cornelius in Acts 10) and is different form Christian baptism which is for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38).

We today are expected to obey the gospel by embracing Christian baptism; however, the Holy Ghost baptism is not something that is applicable to us today. ~Larry

For instance, on one occasion Pilate asked (Matt. 27:22 KJV) What shall I do then with Jesus which is called Christ? What a pertinent question for us to ask today. What will you do with Jesus? Are you willing to accept and obey His terms or do you wish to attach additional stipulations? Another question closely related was posed by Jesus Himself. (Luke 6:46 KJV) And why call ye me, Lord, Lord, and do not the things which I say? It's not uncommon to hear people say that they love Jesus, yet by their very actions, it's clear that they do not keep his commandments. For instance, they often claim a love for Jesus, but they seldom gather to worship Him as He has asked us to do through the inspired writers (Heb. 10:25). Do you love Jesus? If so, then do what He asked you to do. ~ Larry
